Arid Southwest IPM Network Feb 8, 2011 Greenhouse Acreage for Peppers

Procedure: Al Fournier sent an email request for information to contacts in Arizona, New Mexico and Nevada through the Arid Southwest IPM Network.

Summary of Responses by State Sent by email Feb 10, 2011

Arizona

Arizona produces field-grown chile peppers, primarily in the Southeastern part of the state (Cochise and Graham Counties) and another 200 acres in Yuma in Western AZ. There is no significant commercial production of greenhouse peppers. Sunizona Greenhouses, which is a small 3 acre operation in Southeast AZ, produces some bell peppers, perhaps a couple of hundred plants organically. There are a few plants at Willcox Greenhouse for the owners use only.

Nevada

Jay Davison, with University of Nevada Cooperative Extension, is not aware of any commercial pepper production in greenhouses in Nevada. There are perhaps a few hundred square feet grown under hoop houses but no greenhouse production.

New Mexico

According to Tess Grasswitz with New Mexico University, there is little or no glasshouse production of peppers in New Mexico.

SE California

According to Eric Natwick with University of California Cooperative Extension, there are some peppers grown in shade houses in Coachella Valley, but no greenhouse production in Southeastern CA.
